keeping records

There is no time like today, when you are making New Year's Resolutions, to make a resolution to keep your important art collection records in a safe place. Remember, caring for your collection extends beyond maintaining your artwork's physical condition.

If the thought of record keeping makes your head spin, it will really spin if you experience a disaster like fire or theft and have no documentation for filing an insurance claim. Take the time now to record detailed information in a safe place separate from your artwork. Your art documents are as important as your medical records or investment records, and we recommend you take the time to keep meticulous records for your artwork together in a place that is out of harms way in case of theft or other disasters.

If you keep up with the news, you know what it looks like when devastation strikes caused by wild fires or floods and how quickly everything can change. It's hard to imagine that kind of disaster and what it takes to rebuild ones life and a precious art collection. Protecting your artwork should be a priority like protecting any of your assets. Simply organizing information about a collection can save precious time and provide confidence that everything you need is in a safe place like on a memory stick. Be sure to include as much data as possible, such as:

- photographs of your artwork, with a fullview and close up details—front, back, framed, unframed. Photograph multiple views of three-dimensional art.
- purchase date, price, and title of work (receipt). Scan to a digital file.
- vendor or gallery information
- artist/maker information (biography)

- detailed description of object's subject matter or type of work
- dimensions—framed and unframed for two-dimensional works. Overall and base measurements for three-dimensional works.
- detailed description of object—include location of scratches, dents, abrasions, etc., that may not be visible in photographs.
- copies of all conservation and appraisal reports
- text of inscriptions, markings, and labels
- provenance ownership history
- bibliographic information if your work is cited in any exhibition catalogues, auction catalogues.
- exhibition and loan history.

Most of the information you need will be found on your sales receipt or available through your seller/gallery. To help you start the process of documenting your work, go to our Art Care page for our record form. This file is available as a Word document also and can be modified. We are happy to help you start the process.

REVEILLEKENNEDY



Hunter-Wolff Gallery is pleased to introduce Reveille Kennedy a fine artist who grew up in Pueblo, Colorado.


As far back as she can remember, she built, glued, mixed and painted with old enamel paints on the leftover wood from her father's carpentry shop. She was always intrigued by the flamboyant colors in flowers and bugs, and the running together of the paint colors. Then she flashes her mischievous smile and admits creating art in her dad's workshop wasn't the only place you could find her as a young girl. She loved to climb the tallest trees in the backyard to hang by her knees and practice yodeling.


But yodeling didn't prove to offer much of a professional future and after graduating from high school she attended Pueblo Junior College for two years. Since then she has taken many art workshops and classes around the world. With years of experience and accomplishment behind her, Reveille's paintings hang in England, Scotland, Japan, and around the United States. Although painting for collectors consumes much of her time, she manages to squeeze in teaching workshops and classes from her studio.

When asked what is new to painting, Reveille carefully explained, "It is that indescribable individual scrawl, stroke, line or discriminatory color. It is the puzzling mix of learned and experimented. For me, it is also the flexibility of materials such as photography, the explosion of the internet and ways to create digitally. It is permission to play, although digital art has a long way to go before it compares to a museum quality oil. We also now have many more mediums that have been developed and used on any surface."

But more importantly, Reveille's clients often tell her that her paintings are filled with joy. That makes her happy knowing she is providing a little joy in people's lives. Before wrapping up, she wanted to remind our readers that collecting art is about what you connect with and not what others think. "Don't worry about what others say about what they like or don't like about an art piece. Enjoy the journey of discovery. You may like kitschy art now and find out you like fine art later. Or you may love the sensuousness of a nude and later decide to collect portraiture. It is okay to change. You may buy art that effects social change or you may buy for a particular room in your house. Make sure you know the size of your wall space and pick what You like."
