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Bye-Bye Tarnish

Just when you figured out all you needed to know about Sterling silver, someone comes along with a new improved version called Argentium[®]. Sterling is an alloy or mixture of silver containing 92.5% silver and 7.5% copper or other metals. Sterling silver made in the United States, *except jewelry*, is marked .925-. 999 and silver is 99.9% pure and generally too soft for producing functional objects; therefore, the silver is usually alloyed with copper to give it strength, durability and beauty. But sterling silver tarnishes and needs regular polishing.

Although it costs slightly more than Sterling Silver, Argentium[®] is a welcomed discovery by Peter Johns in 1996, a professor of silversmith at the Art and Design Research Institute, School of Art & Design, Middlesex University in England. The project began in 1990 with research on the effects of germanium additions to silver alloys.



Johns discovered that by reducing the copper content in traditional silver and adding germanium (discovered in Germany nearly 100 year earlier) to silver, it stays bright and beautiful. Imagine silver jewelry, hollowware and sculpture that rarely needs polishing. Argentium forms a clear oxide reducing tarnishing and contains 92.5% silver and no nickel. If you love the look of silver but hate the upkeep, look no further. Argentium only needs minimal care.

For thousands of years, we've worn sterling silver bracelets, earrings, cuffs, rings, and necklaces. This shimmery white metal can be worn day or night and is very popular in everyday jewelry. Silver jewelry is far more affordable than white gold or platinum. Argentium sterling silver used in designs by *Jewelry by Tana* and *DKC Jewelry* is very durable and is easy to clean. Even better, if you have a nickel allergy, you can wear sterling silver earrings and other pieces made with Argentium because there is no nickel. Made by hand in Colorado, Argentium sterling silver jewelry is designed for any occasion.

This kind of silver is very tarnishresistant and only requires a minimal amount of care. You can clean it with a mild detergent and lukewarm water to bring back its shine. To maintain the shine and luster of Argentium silver, simply wipe away any dust or finger marks with a soft cloth. More intricate pieces worn frequently may require an occasional wash in warm soapy water followed by a rinse and patted dry with a soft cloth to avoid watermarks.

An infrequent wipe with a clean silver polishing cloth will help to protect Argentium silver from finger marks and everyday dirt and grime. Never use 'dip-type' polishes or electrolytic cleaning processes with Argentium silver.

Tip: remove Argentium silver jewelry, like all jewelry, before entering chlorinated or salt-water swimming baths, Jacuzzis and before applying cosmetics or hairspray.



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Meet Gina

Growing up in western Montana's Rocky Mountains, Gina Grundemann saw her share of flora and fauna. There are a total of 77 named Rocky Mountain ranges in Montana where she first was drawn to the great outdoors. Later, she decided to make her home next to the San Juan Mountains on the western slope of Colorado. She finds inspiration for her pastoral landscape paintings throughout the western region of Colorado and northern New Mexico. For those familiar with these regions you will recognize iconic views of Montrose, Grand Junction, Hotchkiss, Telluride, Grand Mesa and Colorado National Monument. Favored regions in New Mexico take her to the northern towns of Truchas, Dixon and Taos to paint.





She paints both en plein air as well as in the studio and enjoys exploring diverse color combinations by first wiping on a bright base of magenta or other color on the prepared canvas or panel. Then Gina sketches in the composition loosely with a mixture of burnt sienna and ultramarine blue. As the painting progresses, more darks and lights are added, sometimes allowing the bright ground to peek through. She believes her paintings often take on new directions as she introduces textural patterns, color and movement.

We believe the end result is a painting anyone can admire and enjoy because it takes viewers on a peaceful, restful journey away from the world's chaos.

Gina Grundemann's paintings always offer a place to go away from chaos.

Gina gathers impressions and inspiration by exploring less traveled roads, byways, and rural scenes tucked away in the countryside. Her paintings are created with intent to be welcoming and serene. Gina says because "the world is so chaotic ... we need a place of rest from the excessiveness of technology and materialism." Her paintings provide that "place" and deliver a lasting feel-good moment. As a young girl, she spent many weekends and summers on her grandparent's Montana farm. Influenced by the tranguility of that lifestyle, her internal creative impulse guides her to focus on the simple pleasures found in everyday life whether it is along a country road, an abandoned farmhouse or among the animals grazing on a hillside.
